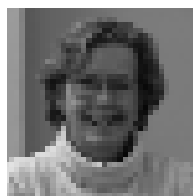
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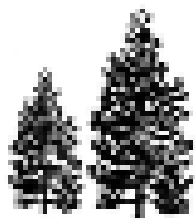

21st Century Diseases in a Flat and Crowded World

Survey the many diseases that have emerged as serious global health problems. From newer diseases such as HIV and AIDs as well as ancient diseases that continue to pose threats, we will investigate the disease process from its origin to treatment and prevention. With an international perspective, we will explore and discuss public health policies and cultural differences with respect to disease detection, treatment and prevention.

Rich Di Pentima holds a B.A., a B.S. in Nursing and an MPH from the University of Oklahoma. He has held many public health positions with the U.S. Air Force, the State of NH and the City of Manchester. He was recently elected to the NH House and serves on the Health and Human Services Committee.

400 Years of Change: From Farms to Forts, Estates to Recreation and Education

From farms to forts, from estates to public recreation and education, journey through 400 years of history of the seaside property (Seacoast Science Center), the site of NH's first European settlement. Learn about a daring proposition that proved to investors that Europeans could survive (and profitably) a New England in the 1620's. Follow the transitions from farms to estates, the abrupt taking of homes during WWII to build Fort Dearborn, the post-war fight over the properties taken and the factors that influenced the final decision and future of Odiorne Point.

At the helm since the Seacoast Science Center opened, Wendy Lull (President) has learned a great deal about Odiorne Point and its rich, fascinating and sometimes turbulent history. Wendy has received numerous awards for her work at the Center and in the community. She edited the book, "Footprints in Time."

Explore various aspects of living styles and patterns of tenancy as it changes from the years of the young Republic to the mid-20th century. Learn about those involved in maritime trades, the women and widows participating in home needle arts for a fee, to employment at the Naval Ship Yard. Particular focus will be on our most recent restoration, the 1836 Leonard Cotton's

Tenant House, which was occupied as a tenant house from its initial construction through the 1960s. Wear warm clothes and footwear (you'll be in and out of buildings and walking on uneven paths).

Kimberly Alexander received her Ph.D. in Art History from Boston University and is currently Chief Curator at Strawbery Banke Museum. She previously served as Curator of Architecture and Design at the Peabody Essex Museum and the MIT Museum. She has published numerous articles many of them on women's letters, architecture and social history.

Toward the end of the 18th century, Wordsworth and Coleridge wrote the "Lyrical Ballads." The Preface proclaimed the poems in the collection would 1) be a gospel of nature, 2) about the dignity of man and 3) use the language of the common man. This course will examine the lives and most representative works of both men.

Ann Cullinan, with an M.A. from Boston College, has taught English in Massachusetts' high schools and at the College of Lifelong Learning (now Granite State College). This will be the fourth class Ann has taught for OLLI.

Abraham Lincoln in New Hampshire

We will examine Abraham Lincoln's four speeches in New Hampshire in March of 1860. Why did he come to the state? What did he say? How did the public perceive him? How did the speeches affect his presidential ambitions? We'll emphasize seeing Abraham Lincoln, not as the great president and martyr but as a former one-term Congressman with a swelling inclination to run for the White House. Suggested reading: "Abraham Lincoln in New Hampshire" by Elwin L. Page (updated by Mike Pride).

Mike Pride, who retired in 2008 after 25 years as editor of the Concord Monitor, is a writer and amateur historian. His books on NH history, all co-authored, include "The New Hampshire Century," "My Brave Boys," "We Went to War" and "Abraham Lincoln in New Hampshire."

Civil War Soldier

We are familiar with names of generals like Lee and Grant and the battles of Antietam or Gettysburg—but how about the everyday life of the Civil War soldier? Thousands of NH's young men volunteered to fight against their fellow Americans, and many died or were seriously wounded during four years of bloody warfare. We'll present the daily trials and tribulations of the Civil

War soldier. You'll gain new perspectives by looking at this conflict through the eyes of the soldiers from both sides.

Warren Sommers, a retired public school and college teacher, has shared an interest in Civil War studies for three decades. He has offered numerous presentations during the past 20 years to schools, colleges, historical societies, and civic and church groups. Since retirement, he has focused on school curricula that address Civil War studies of both the North and the South.
