OLLI at Granite State College (GSC) is an educational program for lifelong learners age 50+ who are eager to explore ideas and interests in a community of peers. Member-led curriculum committees develop our programs in response to member interests. All courses are non-credit and are presented in a non-competitive environment -- there are no tests, grades, or college prerequisites.

Granite State College is one of the four institutions that comprise the University System of New Hampshire, and most OLLI programs are held at GSC facilities or at easily accessible community sites. Classes are led by teachers and community leaders who enjoy sharing their expertise with members whose life experiences enrich an open exchange of ideas.

OLLI at GSC is one of 118 OLLIs at colleges and universities nationwide, all initially grant-funded by the Bernard Osher Foundation. We are a self-sustaining organization that is supported by its membership, in-kind contributions from GSC, an endowment gift from the Bernard Osher Foundation, and other donors who believe in the mission of the program. OLLI at GSC has grown steadily since its inception in 2004.

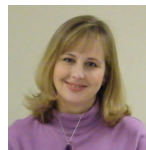
Contact Us

A Trip to the Station – Schiller Station

Don't miss this visit to PSNH's Schiller Station, one of the largest renewable energy projects in the U.S. PSNH replaced one of three coal-fired boilers with this environmentally friendly system that uses wood chips, a clean and renewable resource. While generating cleaner power for about 50,000 NH homes, PSNH reduces coal use by more than 130,000 tons and reduces thousands of tons of emissions. Schiller is the only facility currently replacing fossil-fuel generation with an equivalent amount of cleaner, greener electric power. Dress for outdoor conditions. No open-toed shoes or high heels. Women are encouraged to wear slacks/pants. You will be walking/standing on uneven surfaces. PSNH will provide hard hats, safety glasses and hearing protection required for safety.

The program was arranged by Catalina Celentano, Community Relations Manager of PSNH. After a short presentation, Richard Despina, Plant Manager, will lead a tour of the plant and explain the processes involved in receiving, storing, cleaning and moving wood chips to feed the furnaces.

On board a Coast Guard cutter check out the “mess,” walk the decks and see how “Coasties” live while defending our maritime borders, protecting the environment and saving lives. Participants must be “able-bodied sailors” as we will be walking gangways and climbing shipboard ladders (narrow stairs). You must be able to stand and walk for an hour or more. The cutter is not handicapped-accessible. Wear comfortable shoes and clothing appropriate for early or late fall on the water. Participants will be bused from St. Raphael's Catholic Church (Kittery, ME) to and from the cutter. The date for this special tour will fall between September 8 and October 14. Dates for cutter port time are not disclosed publicly far in advance. Once you have the date, make your decision quickly.

Hear first-hand accounts of the Wallis Sands Life Saving Station surfmen attempting to rescue the craft and crew. One hundred years later, a January storm shifted the sands to reveal a section of hull leading to an archaeological dig. The most recent chapter of the story is still unfolding with efforts to transform a hull fragment into an exhibit at the Seacoast Science Center.

Wendy Lull, President of the Seacoast Science Center, is a former marine biologist and business woman who has worked to build up the Center. Today, the SSC is considered a flagship institution in New Hampshire's cultural economy. In 2010, the Center was chosen by NBC's TODAY Show as one of six Lend a Hand Today recipients. Wendy's prior OLLI program was enthusiastically received.
